

Dear Parents/Carers,

RE: Confirmed Closure of Cheadle Hulme Primary School

As you may be aware, we have now received guidance from the Government that we are advised to close school with effect from today, Friday 20th March.

The school site will be closed until further notice, with the exception of pupils in the following two categories:

1. Identified with certain needs
2. Children of key workers

If it is at all possible for your child to be at home, then they should be. We have asked parents/carers who may fall into the 'key workers' categories and have no alternative means of childcare to enable them to work, to contact us in a separate communication. We will also send further details regarding the onsite care arrangements during normal school hours for next week and beyond.

All other pupils will need to stay at home so we ask that you do not send your child into school from Monday onwards. This is a notable development as it further highlights the important role we all have in helping to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). Parents/carers should do everything they can to ensure children are not mixing socially in a way which can continue to spread the virus.

What we will continue to do whilst pupils are at home

In recent weeks, staff have been working hard developing both paper and online resources for pupils to use and continue their learning at home. All pupils have been sent home with a pack today. If the school remains closed for a longer period of time, as is likely, we will be in touch regarding other methods of remote learning that your child will have access to. We will also be ensuring we continue our pastoral care during this period.

Key Worker Categories

Health and social care

This includes but is not limited to doctors, nurses, midwives, paramedics, social workers, care workers, and other frontline health and social care staff including volunteers; the support and specialist staff required to maintain the UK's health and social care sector; those working as part of the health and social care supply chain, including producers and distributors of medicines and medical and personal protective equipment.

Education and childcare

This includes nursery and teaching staff, social workers and those specialist education professionals who must remain active during the COVID-19 response to deliver this approach.

Key public services

This includes those essential to the running of the justice system, religious staff, charities and workers delivering key frontline services, those responsible for the management of the deceased, and journalists and broadcasters who are providing public service broadcasting.

Local and national government

This only includes those administrative occupations essential to the effective delivery of the COVID-19 response or delivering essential public services such as the payment of benefits, including in government agencies and arms length bodies.

Food and other necessary goods

This includes those involved in food production, processing, distribution, sale and delivery as well as those essential to the provision of other key goods (for example hygienic and veterinary medicines).

Public safety and national security

This includes police and support staff, Ministry of Defence civilians, contractor and armed forces personnel (those critical to the delivery of key defence and national security outputs and essential to the response to the COVID-19 pandemic), fire and rescue service employees (including support staff), National Crime Agency staff, those maintaining border security, prison and probation staff and other national security roles, including those overseas.

Transport

This includes those who will keep the air, water, road and rail passenger and freight transport modes operating during the COVID-19 response, including those working on transport systems through which supply chains pass.

Utilities, communication and financial services

This includes staff needed for essential financial services provision (including but not limited to workers in banks, building societies and financial market infrastructure), the oil, gas, electricity and water sectors (including sewerage), information technology and data infrastructure sector and primary industry supplies to continue during the COVID-19 response, as well as key staff working in the civil nuclear, chemicals, telecommunications (including but not limited to network operations, field engineering, call centre staff, IT and data infrastructure, 999 and 111 critical services), postal services and delivery, payments providers and waste disposal sectors.
